Charlotte-based Raycom Sports is a leading independent sports sales & marketing, syndication, event management and production firm. Raycom holds the ACC digital rights and syndicated television rights of ACC men's basketball and football telecasts through 2026-2027.

In a partnership with the ACC and ESPN, Raycom operates the ACC Network, which distributes ACC content through live television broadcasting, original programming via digital technologies, historical archives, mobile applications, social media, ACC Championship events and the official ACC website.

Raycom Sports' parent company Raycom Media, located in Montgomery, AL, owns and operates 53 television stations covering over 12 percent of the United States across 18 states.

OWNERSHIP

Raycom Sports was founded on June 19, 1979 by Rick and Dee Ray of Charlotte, NC. The company was sold in 1994 to Ellis Communications. The company was then sold by Ellis in 1996 to a television group funded by the Retirement Systems of Alabama. They adopted the name Raycom Media for the parent company.

PRODUCTION CAPABILITIES

Raycom Sports owns two state-of-the-art 53-foot HD production trucks. Each truck is equipped with nine HD cameras, an Evertz VIP virtual monitoring wall, a Calrec Artemis audio console, two EVS six channel full edits for record and playback, and two four channel EVS's for record and playback. Both trucks have a Grass Valley Kayenne switcher and Chyron DUET Hyper X3 graphics. Raycom also has a HD redundant uplink truck.

Raycom Sports' production facility houses five Avid HD edit bays and a custom-built studio and workspace where the ACC Digital Network originates.
